DAY 3: CLARKSTON TO WAITSBURG

TODAY'S RIDE

Today, be sure to take advantage of rest and water stops prior to lunch. The route to lunch isn't that difficult, just a little longer than a typical CO day. It's also a good idea to not tarry in camp – there's the potential for some wind in the afternoon, so arriving in camp early may not be a bad idea. There are many ranches, but few towns, along this day's route. For example, Pomeroy is the only incorporated city in Garfield County. If you need supplies along the way beyond what CO provides, Pomeroy is the place. After leaving Pomeroy, the shoulder narrows for 12 miles, so be sure to ride single-file and watch for cars. We have a second water stop at a state

wayside and then it's on to Starbuck for lunch. After Starbuck, we climb and then descend through rolling wheatland until arriving in Waitsburg.

SUN, WIND AND WOW

Sometimes technology and fun come together in great ways. This year on Cycle Oregon, green energy and bike philanthropy have joined up on a fairly amazing project. If you stroll by the **Community Cycling Center's** tents, you might see an interesting array of solar and wind power technology. The HER system (hybrid energies renewables) is the invention of **Tom Ullmann**, a renewable energy entrepreneur, and it's providing the power needs of the CCC this week.

Let's try to explain this concisely: Four solar panels and a customized wind turbine generate power, which is transmitted to a stored energy system - a group of sealed batteries (no maintenance, no hydrogen gas). From there, an inverter converts that power to AC electricity, only as the CCC's power needs dictate at any particular time. The stored energy system can hold 800 amp-hours (equivalent to 20 kilowatt hours, about enough to power a home for a day). That's more than enough to run the CCC's 154 charging stations, says the organization's

Volunteer and Outreach Coordinator, **Brian Benson**, who's a big fan of the system. "It's parallel to what the bike itself represents: taking care of the environment, not wasting natural resources. This system uses technology to accomplish greater social good. Plus, it looks cool!"
